Thanks to Karen and Dalton Carmichael and the Emmanuel Church Council, we are pleased to provide an October edition of Emmanuel's Newsletter. Everything changed at Emmanuel United Church on March 16^{th} when we went into lockdown: staff worked from home, we transitioned to online worship and pastoral visits were restricted to graveside services and phone calls. We have since reopened our doors for public worship, and I just heard our Prime Minister announce on social media, that we are in the middle of a second wave of Covid 19 with numbers spiking even higher, as of yesterday (October 8^{th} 2020).

We have adapted to new guidelines as mandated by our Province and local health unit, we are being formed into a new community that is more mindful of health and safety. Many of us would have spent less traditional thanksgiving in an effort to promote health and well-being. Everything about our context seems different.

We are in a strange and wild place. We are living through our own wilderness experience and there are no quick fixes or easy answers. We are unlearning and learning new norms for being in community. We have been doing this for almost a year. It feels like a long time.

Glennon Doyle in her book *Untamed* has a style that uniquely personal, vulnerably honest, and raw. I am sharing with you some of her words about how the pandemic is changing us:

When this is over, we will be different – my mom and I.

We used to believe there was solid ground.

When my mom and I finally run toward each other, we will check each step. We will expect tremors.

When this is over, our children will be different.

They have seen the worst of us.

They know now that we don't know.

That we don't know how to save them.

That sometimes we do know--but we don't do it.

When this is over -- we will all be different.

Let Us Vow to Stay Different.

In the after:

Let us keep our to-do lists shorter.

Let us keep our grudges shorter.

Our patience, our visits, our naps, our laughter, our embraces--Let's make them longer.

In the after, let us refuse to be tricked again into believing that

We are what we get done.

We are who we align with, who we hate, what we reject, what we have and consume and produce and save and spend and claim.

No.

We Are Who And What We Love.

That is all we've ever been and that is all we'll ever be.

We are our mothers and our fathers and our friends and our sisters and our brothers and our grandparents and our grandchildren and our children and our books and our pets and our neighbors and our couches and our sunsets and that long walk down that one path where the light slices through the trees just right and reminds us of magic.

When this is over, we will be different.

Let us vow to Stay different.

Let us remember Who We Are.

And to those of you who say:

"We won't remember. We will go back to 'normal.' People always do."

To those I say: You don't know us.

We've missed our people.

We've missed everything.


We are different.

Cleaning/Disinfecting

Taping off the unused areas of the church with caution tape has happened. As for those coming to the church office: Secretary to use answering machine to open the door for people. A list of needed disinfecting and safety supplies was formed with Janie and Merlin Clayton shopping for them.

Procedures for Opening

Entering the building...all must wear Masks. If you don't have one, one will be given.

Bud McMartin wrote a letter on Reopening guidelines to deliver to all members.

To attend the church service, we ask that people call the church, give your phone number and name, and leave a message by Friday Noon. This allows us to set up the safe seating and to make a list of contacts as required under covid. Pylons will be set up for physical distancing to enter the sanctuary and the church. If you haven't phoned in, and find you are now able to come to service, the remaining seats will be available on a first come first serve basis.



A. Entrance/Exit & Signage

Church service attendees may enter the church by Williams St. door or by Lakeshore Dr. door. A greeter will be a both entrances.

- ✓ Worship committee (Judy Pronovost) will get 2 ushers each week to welcome and direct attendees to and from their seats.
- ✓ Greeters (Bud McMartin) will ask about covid safety, dispense hand sanitizer and check off your name on our list of attendees.
- ✓ Signage regarding Covid-19 and safety requirements are up in the church.

B. Bathroom Use?

A container of disinfectant wipes will be placed on the bathroom counters with instruction for use. Other safety signage will posted as well.

The kitchen bathroom will be off limits as will the kitchen

C. Seating Plan, Spacing Requirements

Merlin Clayton, Bob Pronovost and Bud McMartin arranged the seating according to the contact list from Sheila. There will be groups of 2 or 3 seats. A person not sitting with someone will occupy one of the two seats and the other will be left vacant. Seating rules and participation rules will be on the overhead. Ushers will direct the movement of members for exiting.

D. Hymn Books, Collection Plate, Order of Service

We will not be using these items at this time. Collection plate or box will be at back of church to deposit your collection as you enter.

Rental/complimentary Use of Spaces

We do not have the volunteers or the cleaning personnel to offer space to outside groups at this time. Merlin has arranged for 3 outside door locks to be retumbled and new keys made. The keys have been given out.

Other Considerations

Emmanuel groups that wish to hold meetings at church will be responsible for their own cleaning before and after the meeting. A list of guidelines will be forthcoming.

They are under final committee review prior to sending them to council and Committee representatives for their review and input. Barring any further unprecedented events, we are hopeful to have them ready for the next Annual Congregational Meeting in the first quarter of 2021.

ARE YOU A MEMBER OF EMMANUEL UNITED CHURCH?



As we attempt to update the Historic Roll of Emmanuel United Church, we find that there are many who have their name on the roll, but who are unable to attend church. We have also noted that there are people who attend church every Sunday, but they are not on our Historic Roll. Are you one of these people? Are you interested in becoming a member of Emmanuel United Church? Would you like to have your membership transferred to another church?

Often times a person, or a family will relocate into a new area and find a church to attend, and either forget to request a transfer from their former church, or do not realize

that they have to request a transfer to their new church. IF you are interested in being on the Historic Roll of Emmanuel United Church you should contact Rev. Roni. Conversely, should you require a transfer to another church, simply contact Rev. Roni and that transfer will be done for you.



Property Committee

Property has worked on being more energy efficient. We are trying to cut down the cost of Hydro. The skylight in the sanctuary has been insulated, the vent over the gas ranges has been insulated, and the last major retrofit involved replacing all 4 ft. flourescent lights with L.E.D. lights. This brought the wattage down from 35 watts per light bulb to 13 watts for 121 light bulbs. As the church has been shut since this change, the savings cannot be measured at this time.

As part of the reopening the church plan, the 3 main locks for the outside doors were retumbled and new keys made.

The buzzer video system at the doors is working well. A major portion of this was paid by the former U.C.W. group.

\$ and Sense (October 2020)

The impact of the pandemic on church activities prevented the monthly \$ and Sense bulletin insert. The new normal will likely yield a different means of monthly communication. All 130+ families of the congregation did receive a letter highlighting Emmanuel's current financial status in September.

The diligent and concerted efforts of our Treasurer, Brenda Cote, resulted in Emmanuel benefiting from the Federal wage subsidy programs to cope with the pandemic. Emmanuel has received \$20,567 to date. This support offsets lost revenues from hall rentals and Emmanuel's traditional suppers during the church closure in 2020.

The reality promoted over the past two years is that Emmanuel needs to "right size" and continue within our means. We can endeavour to be more relevant to more people; and/or control our needs through collaboration or restraint. The congregation through offerings and efforts (suppers); and the community needs served by our building is Emmanuel's only means to be sustainable.

Emmanuel is pursuing a Federal CEBA program loan of \$40,000. The loan is to be applied to assist in offsetting deficits with respect to staff costs (71% of budget) over the near future. The loan will be repaid prior to Dec. 31, 2022. It affords time to consider and determine what measures are within Emmanuel's means to continue as a sustainable United Church ministry.

Emmanuel has set a standard others wish to achieve with the annual Cookie Walk. We are pursuing approval for this to continue in 2020 (tentatively Nov. 22th). Approval through North Bay and District Health Unit would entail satisfying Provincial efforts to manage risk. Hopefully Emmanuel's 11th annual Cookie Walk will occur and members of our congregation can again demonstrate their culinary skills.

Thank you, your thoughts, talents and prayers are Emmanuel's foundation. Focused effort and teamwork will assure Emmanuel's future.



CHURCH FINANCES



News from the National UCW

I received the Canadian Shield Region UCW Special Fall 2020 Newsletter from Dawn Monroe, President. I know that Emmanuel no longer has a UCW unit, but there are still some of us who are life members and may be interested in this summary.

The NUCW annual executive meeting was held by zoom last week with 33 attendees. Day One's guest was Rebecca Hornberg with the United Church bookstore, UCRD – web site ucrdstore.ca. Dawn noted that prepackaged communion kits with pre-filled cups and a wafer packaged individually are available and that church calendars with a new price will be on sale soon online.

Day Two dealt with finances. NUCW does not have a bank account of its own. When you send cheques to the NUCW simply make the cheque to the United Church of Canada and in the memo line of cheque put UCW and what the money is for. Erik Mathieson, Chief Financial Officer

Erik Mathieson, Chief Financial Officer of the United Church of Canada spoke about government grants for churches & UCWs available due to Covid-19 through CEWS plan. Slides presented can be made available.

Day Three was 'report day'. With the UCC offices closed mail has been delayed in getting to the right department. Patience is requested. Amy Crawford from the Church in Mission team in Toronto led a virtual Bible study with break out zoom groups. After more reports, there was discussion about UCW being represented on Regional Council executives. The 60th Anniversary report stated that they have confirmed Men of the Deep coming to perform in Sidney, Nova Scotia.

Day Four dealt with the 2021 budget. **Keeping in Touch** will no longer be distributed to church offices but will be sent to UCW regional representatives for distribution or can also be found on the NUCW web pages. Nora Sanders, outgoing UCC General Secretary was guest speaker and feels comfortable leaving the job with Rev. Michael Blair.

Day Five opened the zoom meeting to 130 ladies for the closing communion service given by Rev. Michael Blair. Carolle Dallas-Arbuckle is working on writing and collecting weekly devotionals for UCW. If people wish they may send original devotionals with opening prayer, Bible readings, write up of approx. 400 words, and closing prayers. They must be original. NUCW will hold copyright.


